


"The Butterfly, the Badger, and the Body"

Pay Taxes OR Give a Scholarship?

HPCA means the world to me and my wife, Pearl! It's where I "cut my teeth" in ministry as the school's first kindergarten teacher from 1999 to 2003. I also served as director of development and later as board president. At HPCA, I am confident that disciples are being made and sent out. So, anytime we are given an opportunity to "sow" into HPCA, we take it, if we are able. A few years ago, Jen Deane, HPCA's director of development, let me know that we could give our

PA tax dollars toward HPCA scholarship through the Opportunity Scholarship Tax Credit program. Once our PA tax liability reached \$3,500, we were eligible to participate! It was simple. I filled out a one-page document, sent it in to Central Pennsylvania Scholarship Fund (which, at NO charge, helps HPCA register donors), and later sent our donation to the scholarship fund. At tax time, I claimed the credit and received 90% of my donation back as a refund. This opportunity was a no brainer. I was ALREADY giving a small monthly donation to HPCA, so I simply redirected those funds into this program, and my donation exponentially multiplied on behalf of the students, parents, teachers, and administrators of HPCA. It's really an extremely easy process, and our tax dollars can be used towards a Kingdom cause! Please reach out to Jen Deane (jen@hpcaphilly.org) right now - don't wait! GIVING BACK

In order to encourage our students to learn a life of generosity, we decided to fundraise support for a ministry of the students' choice. The students voted to support Friends of Children's Village, a Christian orphanage and school in India that takes in "untouchable" children. One student explained that he wanted to support this ministry because, "I was adopted, so I know what it's like not to be able to see your family. You need people to support you, so I thought this was a good way to give toward that." Students were able to purchase dressdown days on Valentine's Day, dressing in red and pink, and on "Twos-Day" (Tuesday, 2/22/22), wearing two shirts or pants, with all funds going to the orphanage.





DAY OF PRAYER



Our school-wide theme this year is "Kneeling We Rise." This long pandemic has forced us to alter so much about our lives, but prayer remains a key component of life at HPCA. Each month, we set aside a "Day of

Prayer." Though we cannot physically gather together in one place to pray, Mrs. Figueiredo has found an alternative approach. We use the intercom system to broadcast to everyone! Every hour, a different student heads to the office to lead the whole school in prayer. Often, students read a prayer that they have written. Even


though classes are kept separated, HPCA students and staff are still praying in unison multiple times per day during our monthly "Day of Prayer."



CELEBRATING **Black History Month**







While our HPCA community celebrates ethnic and racial diversity year-round, we also think it is very important to make space that is focused on learning the particularities of Black history in the United Sates. For this reason, we encourage our teachers to incorporate intentional projects and activities that honor Black history in the classroom during February. To give you a glimpse of what this looks like, you can see Mrs. Miller's doorway pictured, announcing that "Black history is American history." Walking through the door, you would witness students engaged in discussion and projects, delving into the work of Black authors. In the office, you might catch our students recording Black poetry for our virtual chapel, or you may even witness Mr. Caro joining his social studies classes practicing traditional African dances and learning their cultural significance on YouTube. Going down to the basement, you would quickly be drawn to a timeline on the wall sharing important landmarks in the Black freedom struggle in the United States. Through all of these activities and more, we hope to honor the legacy of Black history, while also encouraging our students to forge a future that more deeply reflects the justice
