In leaving my family, I quickly found I was enveloped by a new spiritual family. HPCA welcomed me like a son and a brother. I found a community that cared about my gifts and wanted to see them blossom and grow in service to God's Kingdom. But even more importantly, I found that they cared for their wider community just as much as they cared for me. They treated every student who walked through their doors as family, extending this same welcome and belonging. They encouraged the gifts they saw in them. They were committed, in a way I had never seen before, to making sure a quality, Christian education was financially accessible to all kids. especially those who have not been given access historically.



Often, when one sees behind the scenes of an institution, it can cause him or her to lose respect or hope. At HPCA, it has been quite the opposite experience. Having taken on additional administrative responsibilities, seeing the inner workings has only increased my love and trust of this place. With each word of affirmation spoken over a student, prayer offered for single parents at the limits of exhaustion, compassionate plan to help families find seemingly-impossible funds, and many other acts of goodness I witness daily, I become more grateful to be part of this community that so clearly reflects the light of Jesus Christ. I pray every one of you experiences the same.
