Happily, this story is not a totally unique occurrence. At HPCA, God has been so good to us. This year, we have a total of seven children of HPCA alumni. Seven! It honestly feels like we get to witness God's gifts and blessings folding upon each other.

DID YOU KNOW?

- The tuition at HPCA is \$6,100 per year, but no parent pays that amount! 100% of our students receive a grant -in-aid that lowers their payments to \$2,400 for the first child, \$1,600 for the second child, and \$1,100 for every other child in the family.
- Parent payments only cover 26% of HPCA's total operating costs!
- In addition to affordable tuition scholarship, and sibling discounts, we also offer income-based scholarship to help our lower-income families.
- To make sure HPCA is affordable for everyone, we also offer hardship scholarships to families who need extra help.
- This year, we need to raise \$743,000 in total contributions to keep HPCA affordable. Also, individuals and businesses in PA can receive a 90% tax credit by donating scholarship funds. Email jen@hpcaphilly.org to find out how!

God is good!

My name is Randy Caro, and I would like to formally introduce myself as the new Dean of Students. I am a proud alumnus of HPCA who graduated in 2010 after completing all ten years of school offered here. I was born and raised in Hunting Park and many of my greatest memories, as well as the foundation for my Christian faith, I attribute to HPCA.

When I started school, my family was not Christian, but I was getting a biblical foundation at HPCA that led me to faith in Jesus. I remember a service where my class was bawling because of the words a local minister shared. It was the first time I experienced the Holy Spirit ministering to me. I remember how the faculty expressed God's love during a time of deep family loss. They supported me and my grandma emotionally, and even financially, when we were alone. And of course, in 1st grade, I met my best friend, Kayla, who introduced me to my church home and eventually became my wife. All these experiences helped my faith develop and grow.

Because of my life's story, I feel God has given me a special ability to connect with students. I know what it is like to grow up as a racial minority in a single-parent/grandparent-led household in a neighborhood like Hunting Park. Society and statistics stated that it would be less likely for me to pursue an undergraduate degree as a Latino male from North Philadelphia, and that I could have easily been part of the 10.7% of Latino dropouts in 2014. However, God's favor has been over me, and I have pursued further education from La Salle University and Missio Seminary. This also means I know what it looks like to minister the love of God to our students in a real way that speaks to their circumstances.

For all these reasons, it is my honor, not only as Dean of Students, but as a Latino Christian male - a minority - to utilize my experience and education to serve the underdeveloped communities of Philadelphia, motivating and setting an example for our children that God has greater and more prosperous things for them. I am eager to embark on this new journey with our students, investing in them as I have been invested in, and encouraging them to be great leaders that transform their communities.
